
# Dunedin, New Zealand - January 1969

"Are we of the First?" "Are we?"
"No WE are."

"We are"

"Hush children, the Moa bones and the greenstone adze from the DEEP LEAD prove that others lived, fought and died here a VERY long time ago. We are all, in this first Century, near enough to remember, or to have heard from our elders, of the hardships, the deprivations, the lonelinesses and the heartbreaks of those FIRSTS. We all hope we have a little of their calibre in us and while each of us privately hugs our own Family History of Endeavour, we gather to honour the achievements of them all.





As they went further inland they took their belongings as best they could.





In small groups they prospected for gold in likely gullies where there was a stream.

In 1861 - 34 ozs. of coarse nuggetty gold was found at Post Office Creek and -

The Waipori Gold Field was DISCOVERED - "By "O'Hara and his mates" at what was then known as the Vertaburn".

THE AREA WAS DECLARED A GOLDFIELD.

In 1862, a  $12\frac{1}{2}$  oz. nugget was found in Nuggetty Gully by George Skeen.

News of this - and The Gold Rush was ON.

To quote McCoy:

"Dunedin was then a "deserted village". Left in a hurry, gone to the goldfields, were all the gentlemen adventurers. High hope, courage, love of adventure, and the search for the unknown mainly moved these pioneers. The lust of gain had little if any part in their thoughts. They had come from the far ends of the earth, from high places and happy homes, to a new and unknown country to seek their fortunes. More power to them, those worthy pioneers.

The clear golden sunshine striking on the new billies and pannikins of the venturesome band of miners marching in steady procession over the ranges made a never-to-be-forgotten picture, for here was history in the making.

The men made peat or "sod" houses.

They had the art of thatching them with reed so that they were weatherproof and the women had the art of making them into comfortable homes - most attractive with white wash of blue clay.

I remember as a little girl Mrs Blackmore showing me how the hearth and fire surround at her home were white washed every morning from a tin of liquid blue clay about which hung a wide flat brush. This blue clay dried spotlessly white - typical of her immaculate home.



In 1963 - a 27 oz. nugget - the largest for Waipori - was found at Post Office Creek by Davies.

In 1963 - a 15 oz. nugget was found at Bungtown past Reedy Creek on the road to Lawrence.

No wonder the land teamed with busy people.



Housing, food and supplies from water pipes to dredges had to be brought from Dunedin. "come Hell or High Water", teams and teamsters HAD to get the goods over the tussock hills where as yet there were no roads.

They got there - and homes came into being by ships to New Zealand and by bullock waggon to Waipori. Homes of peat and thatch or of corrugated iron-brolight. Fences were of wire and iron standards.

How WONDERFUL those first women folk must have been. There was no wood in those tussock hills. It had to be brought from 'The Bush' - 12 bullock miles away. Michael Tohill attended to his first necessity and for that great blessing his name goes down in Waipori History.

It is hard to realise now as we press a button or turn on a switch that for many of us as well as well as our parents and grandparents - there was no such luxury at Waipori. Every single thing had to be done the hard way from making the candles and collecting the river driftwood. How those women could make the best of things! Although they worked like their men folk, skirts stayed at button-boot ankle length. Corsets, pintucks, frills, flounces, high starched collars, curls and back-combing of hair stayed IN. Hedges and trees were planted and gardens made between boiling up the copper and bread making. Early Settlers we salute you!


Robert Cotton, the 'Grand Old Man' of Waipori lived there from when his older sister Florence (later Mrs Taylor) and he (aged 24) arrived in 1862 - until his death in 1918 at the age of 80.

He and his wife purchased land which became The Station. His prolific beard which became white as time progressed was distinctive even at a time when white beards were The Mode.



(His wife was Margaret, the daughter of Atkinson of The House on The Hill, Atkinson died as the result of being stabbed for gold and supplies by robbem Jones in 1866. Margaret tried to save her father but was stabbed in the hip, The glow of her 'ever-after' little night lamp could be seen at the Homestead until her death in 1926),

"The Octtons were there right through the heat and burden of the day and the family lived happily in the Same spot until the 1940's - the land eventually passing to but one grandson.








R. Cotton, S. Henry, T. Dickson, Cox and Cable were some of those who were determined to have what was necessary by bullock teams over those tussocks, and after them, M. Toohill, C. McCann and G. amd T. Williams followed that method of transport as a vocation, but track roads were formed and the bullocks were immediately followed by horses: horses, sixteen in a team, horses in fours and twos, drafthorses and thoroughbreds. Only we of this first century can understand or recall seeing the terrific effort those creatures made to assist man in his endeavour.

At the foot of the steep pinch they would muster their strength and then exerting all their full power and willingness would rush up that toughest slope.

They pulled and heaved. They got things there. They swam the floods through dredge holes and across the Flat in the saving of people from drowning. Their endeavour brought comfort dignity and a great deal of fun. They even brought about Waipori Gentlemen Riders Race Meetings before those same horses went off to the Boer War and to World War I.




Perhaps it was because the men worked for the most part in extremely cold, wet and rough conditions with an El Dorado always just around the corner that their women folk took a wonderful pride in having their homes comfortable and immaculate and yet with the ever-ready hospitality of appetising Home Cooking.


With all this too went the typical musical ability of the day. In the earlier part of the Gold Rush days Thomas Bracken - who later wrote well known pieces such as 'God Defend New Zealand' and the poem 'Not Understood'; J. J. Wood - later of Lawrence - who wrote 'The Imp Waltz' among other compositions; and Arthur Eaton, Waipori violinist - really made the dance hall swing to piano, violin and cello rollicking rousing music.


The phonograph at the Nicholson home was the wonder of its day and many an enthralled hour was spent listening to Harry Lauder and others. The Russel 'Boys' - George and Frank - played the violin. Irene Cotton and Elfrida Knight played the piano. At dances in the Town Hall these five stirred the populace into many a First Set, Quadrills or Valeta and Walter Eaton would vie that he could swing young Nellie O'Brien or the Dunbar girls more giddily off their feet than the Cotton boys could swing the Crowley girls.

Families gathered around the piano in the evenings and if there wasn't a piano - well someone always had a mouthorgan or a jews harp, or could play the bag pipes.

People sang. In their search for gold there was a great deal that was preciously Golden in their homes. Many called to hear the first music-and static-over Percy Knights first - home made - crystal sets, and marvelled at this first introduction of radio and then went home to sing those LATEST.









There were quartz reefs opened up. The O.P.Q. Coxs, the Bella (C. Todd, R. McKeitch, Gare Bros. and Tippet were some names connected with it over the years) the Canton and the Antimony Reef. (Many people worked these).

There were dredges - some of them being the Success (W. Hanley) the Empire (McKinlay & Pilling) - equipped by Morgan Cable. The Jutland (C. Todd & J. Johnson), Golden Key (Eaton Bros.), Waipori Flat (McNeil) and The Upper Waipori. There were various Batteries and there were 250 Sluicing Claims 90 of these being Chinese. The Deep Lead probably became the most famous. Telephone connection was made with Lawrence in 1887 and Mr and Mrs Knight kept the Post Office until 1924.



the WAIPORI SCHOOL was built and opened

1867	The School House was built. A handsome bell was bought and erected in an equally handsome stand which stood the test of the years. A Maypole was also erected. Over a century later it still stands erect in the lapping waters of Lake Mahinerangi Dam — a poignant note to the minds of those who have danced around it, weaving and unweaving the coloured streamers down or up the pole as they danced.





Mr Kerr, the School Master who taught at Waipori is definitely a part of the Legend of the Lake Mahinerangi.

His pupils still speak of him with pride in their reminiscences. All their lives his pupils have been able to recite word perfectly such long poems as Battle of Holenlinden, and extracts from Marmion, We are Seven, etc. He did not believe that children "couldn't remember" but that they didn't take the trouble to remember," and as Annie Hynes recalls, "Here is how he taught us to write - to the tune of Bonnets of Dundee -

"Open your copy books, pick up your pens,

And do not go scratching like chickens and hens, Your up strokes make fine, and your down strokes make thick

Write smoothly and gently, not hurried and quick."

Annie was one of a family of six girls and five
sons whose father, Mr Michael Hynes, was killed by
a fall of rock at his claim at Waipori

Another insight to this outstanding teacher comes from his daughter - Girlie - (who is really Mrs Anne Mooney):

"When I was a child at Waipori the appearance of a stranger at the School House usually meant that he either wanted to have his photo taker or a tooth extracted. My father built a dark-room and developed and printed photos of practically everyone in the district.

One of his photos of Waipori, taken from the cemetery hill is enlarged and coloured and is in the Early Settlers' Hall in Dunedin.

My brother Bob and my sister Cecily Lenihan and myself are in the foreground."




